A child age 0-9 years who has a substantial developmental delay or specific congenital or acquired condition may be considered to have a developmental disability without meeting the above criteria, if the child, without services and supports, has a high probability of meeting those criteria later in life.

# Temporary Assistance For Needy Families (TANF) and Temporary Assistance For Other Needy Families (TAONF)

TANF and TAONF are the time-limited welfare reform programs for adults with children. Programs are designed to protect those who cannot work and to require those who are able to work to do so. TANF and TAONF provide monthly cash benefits to families for food, clothing, shelter, and other essentials.
